Foreword

ISO (the International Organization for Standardization) is a worldwide federation of national standards bodies (ISO member bodies). Together with part 1 of ISO 4674, this first edition of ISO 4674-2 cancels and replaces the first edition of ISO 4674 (ISO 4674:1977), which has been technically revised.

ISO 4674 consists of the following parts, under the general title *Rubber- or plastics-coated fabrics — Determination of tear resistance*:

- *Part 1: Constant rate of tear methods*
- *Part 2: Ballistic pendulum method*
